THE INTER-UNIVERSITY BOATRACE. — By the express on Wednesday afternoon the men who are to represent the Adelaide University in the annual inter-University boatrace to be contested on the Parramatta on May 22 left for Sydney. The crew, with the individual weights, is as follows:—Byrne (bow), 11 st.; Heggaton (2), 10 st. 8 lb.; Padman (3), 11 st. 12 lb.; Connor (4), 11 st. 11 lb.; Halcomb (5), 11 st. 13 lb.; Stuart (6), 11 st. 10 lb.; Dow (7), 11 st. 7 lb.; Gosse (stroke), 11 st. 8 lb.; and Marryat (cox.). Mr. W. R. Bayly, an old University stroke, accompanied the eight. "Our boys" will reach Sydney on Friday, and they are to be quartered at Ryde, the head of the course on the Parramatta. Mr. F. Halcomb left for Sydney on Tuesday last, so as to be in time to receive the racer from the Bothwell Castle in Sydney to-day. Mr. E. G. Blackmore, the Chairman of the South Australian Rowing Association, goes over on Friday. Keeping in view the sound work they have done on the Torrens Lake and Port River, and the excellent coaching they will receive while on the Parramatta, the men should give a good account of themselves on the day of the race. There was a large crowd of 'Varsity boys, as well as relations and friends of the departing oarsmen, on the platform to say *au revoir* and wish luck to the eight. Three hearty cheers were sent up as the train steamed out of the station, and the compliment was lustily returned by the crew.

Last week Mr. C. R. Hodge, the Registrar of the Adelaide University, paid a visit to Port Pirie for the purpose of establishing an examining centre in that town. A largely attended meeting was held in the local Council Chamber, presided over by the Mayor, at which it was unanimously decided to form a centre to embrace science and art, as well as music. A strong representative committee of nineteen members was elected, with Mr. J. C. Haslam, the Mayor of the town, as permanent Chairman. This is, however, not to be an *ex officio* position, for Mr. Haslam will continue to act as Chairman when his term of office as Mayor has expired. Mr. K. W. Duncan was elected to the position of Hon. Secretary. At the conclusion of the meeting a vote of thanks was carried to the Council of the University for their action in the matter. The first musical examinations of the new centre will be held in June next, when the first primary examinations come on.

A large number of entries have, we understand, been received in Melbourne and Sydney, where the Board has established "centres;" but up to the present Adelaide is not represented.

UNIVERSITY SHAKESPEARE SOCIETY.  
The annual meeting of the University Shakespeare Society was held at the University on Thursday evening. Dr. Barlow (vice-president) occupied the chair. The hon. secretary's report and the balance-sheet, which showed a credit balance, on the year's transactions, were adopted. Dr. Barlow introduced "Richard I." as the subject of special study during the session. A vote of thanks was passed to the retiring officers, and a number of new members were admitted. A forecast of the coming session was given, showing that several lectures had been arranged for from popular authorities on Shakespeare, and musical and dramatic evenings would also be held.
