NEW RHODES SCHOLAR

Mr. Cecil Madigan Selected.

Ten Applicants.

A meeting of the selection committee of the Rhodes Scholarship was held at Government House on Monday morning to select the Rhodes' scholar for 1911. There were present:—His Excellency the Governor (Admiral Sir Day Hort Bosanquet) (Chairman), the Chief Justice (Sir Samuel Way), Professors Henderson and Taylor, and Messrs. G. J. R. Murray, K.C., J. R. Fowler, M.A., and the Secretary (Mr. C. R. Hodge). There were 10 applicants, and after a long sitting the committee chose Mr. Cecil Thomas Madigan, of Ambleside. Mr. Madigan was born on October 15, 1889, and was taught by his mother until he was 12 years of age. During six months of 1902 he attended the Durwood Public School, passed the primary examination in five subjects, and gained a public exhibition tenable at the Pupil Teachers' School for three years—1903-5. His record is as follows:—1903—Passed junior examination in seven subjects, three credits, twenty-seventh on honour list. 1904—Passed senior in seven subjects, one credit, twenty-first on honour list. 1905—Passed higher in five subjects, twelfth on honour list, won old scholars' prize, and was dux of Pupil Teachers' School. 1906—Entered P.A.C., gained third-form prize and German prize, passed higher examination in five subjects with honours in pure mathematics and German, seventh on honour list and third from South Australian candidates, thus winning second University scholarship of £30 per annum for three years. 1907-10—Followed the mining course at the University, and gained first classes in 14 subjects. 1910—Won first prize and silver medal for mechanical drawing, South Australian Chamber of Manufactures examination, and granted portion of a forfeited scholarship as extension of scholarship by Education Department. Mr. Madigan has been prominent in sport. He was awarded the "double blue" of the Adelaide University Sports' Association for rowing and rifle shooting. His career as an outdoor enthusiast was thus summarized for the committee:—"Rowing, 1907—Stroke of Engineering crew, Junior Schools Race, 3 in Forrester Fours crew, Summer Regatta of South Australian Rowing Association beaten in final heat. Rowed in S.A.R.A. Scratch Fours. 1909—Stroke of Maiden Fours, S.A.R.A. Autumn Regatta; stroked and won Forrester Fours and Le Hunte Cup Fours, Summer Regatta. 1910—Stroke of and won Forrester Fours for the second time in succession, thus winning the cup for the University; stroked and won Senior-Junior Fours, Autumn Regatta; stroked a Scratch Four crew, rowed in and won Senior Schools' Race for Engineering School. Rowed 4 in winning Inter-Varsity Eight. At present training as stroke of a senior crew for Summer Regatta. Rifle Shooting, 1909—Classed as marksman for musketry course. Won an individual prize in S.A. National Rifle Association Meeting, and shot in team for University, making top score. 1910—Shot in Imperial Universities' rifle match, fifth score, Adelaide team second only to Oxford University; top scorer of Adelaide team, Australian Universities' rifle match, and beaten only by one man in the three

—Final Conservatorium Concert.—

Monday night's was the last concert of the Conservatorium season, when a programme was presented by students. The year's awards and diplomas (already published) were distributed and conferred by the Vice-Chancellor of the University (Dr. Barlow). Mr. Bevan's choral class contributed Mendelssohn's 114th Psalm with expression and nice tone. Mr. Arthur B. Williamson, A.M.U.A., was again seen at the organ, and Miss Beatrice Wallmann, A.M.U.A., played the pianoforte accompaniment. Miss Kathleen Adams (winner of the Ennis prize) played the brilliant D'Albert arrangement of the Bach prelude in fugue in D Major. Miss Una Andrew, another young, and big-voiced contralto, made a pleasing debut in "The Enchantress." Mr. Winsloe Hall accompanied. Part of Tartini's "Devil's Trill" was given by Miss Denise Jacob with more grace than realism. Mr. Frank Charlton, the possessor of a deep and mellow voice, put expression into Sullivan's "Thou'rt passing hence." The winner of the Bevan prize for vocal accompanist, Miss Ethel Tod, pleased the large audience with her execution of Rubinstein's "valse caprice." Miss May Chamberlain employed her unusually light soprano in the well-known Sullivan song "Poor wandering one"—an essay which would have been the more marked had it been without a nervous vibration. In the vieuxtemps ballade and polonaise (Op. 38), Miss Hilda Reimann (Scholar) gave an excellent idea of her skill as a violinist. Miss Hilda Wheeler displayed a smooth sweet soprano range in "Angels ever bright and fair;" and the programme closed with Miss Ethel Doenau's clever rendition of Chopin's C sharp minor nocturne and Debussy's remarkable A minor prelude.
