#### A SOUTH AUSTRALIAN SCHOLAR'S SUCCESS.

The friends of Mr. R. L. Robinson, B.Sc., who was the second South Australian Rhodes scholar, and began his career at Oxford two years ago, will be gratified to hear that he has gained further distinction for himself there. Mr. Robinson took the associate diploma of the School of Mines and Industries in the same year that he won his B.Sc. degree at the Adelaide University, and his brilliant work in the two courses made him stand out prominently as one of the most distinguished South Australian students of the year. Not long after settling down at Oxford he passed an examination which entitled him to enter the Forestry Department of India. His latest achievement is to take the B.A. degree at Oxford and win a Baroness Burdett-Coutts scholarship, which will enable him, as he said in a letter to his parents, who are residing at Coolgardie at present, "to be in clover" for the remaining twelve months of his residence at Oxford. Mr. Robinson said that Mr. Norman Jolly, B.A., B.Sc., the first Rhodes scholar, had left for India, where he had joined the Forestry Service.

#### ELDER CONSERVATORIUM.

The final students' concert of the present season in connection with the Conservatorium was given at the Elder Hall on Monday evening in the presence of a large audience. An excellent programme, illustrative of the work of the institution, was submitted, and was carried out in a thoroughly meritorious manner. The opening number comprised the motets "Judge me, O God" and "Hear my prayer" (Mendelssohn), and was rendered by a choir of about 80 voices, under the able baton of Mr. F. Bevan, with Mr. A. B. Williamson presiding at the organ. The singing was admirable in balance, tone quality, and expression. Miss Doris Wylie took the solo part in the latter item, and acquitted herself creditably. Altogether the number reflected great credit on the chorus and conductor. Miss Beatrice Wallmann, a young pianoforte student of good promise, played the "Rondo brillante," op. 62 (Weber), with nice effect. A Brahms number, "Variations on a theme of Paganini," gave the talented young pianist, Miss Carlien Jurs, an opportunity of displaying her brilliant technique, and the item was much appreciated by the audience. Another piano solo, "Polonaise," op. 17 (Moszkowski), was performed by Mr. Gordon Short, who showed considerable powers as an executant, and manipulated the instrument skilfully. In the violin selection, "Adagio from G minor concerto" (Max Bruch), Miss Denise Jacob played with nice feeling and skill, although apparently she was somewhat nervous. Miss Daisy Kennedy displayed commendable taste and fine execution in her violin solo, "Finale, also from G minor concerto" (Bruch). Herr H. Heinicke acted as pianoforte accompanist for both the violinists. Some really fine work was done in the vocal solo numbers. Miss Martha Bruggemann gave an altogether charming rendering of the beautiful song from "La Perle du Bresil," "Charmant oiseau" (Felicien David), with flute obligato by Mr. A. Bohm. The popular soprano completely won the audience with her artistic treatment of the work, and after returning to the platform about half a dozen times she was compelled to repeat a portion of the song, notwithstanding that it is quite unusual to give encore items at these concerts. Miss Marion Kemp, who possesses a contralto voice of fine quality, sang the recitative and air, "E questo il loco" and "Ah, se tu dormi svegliati" (Vaccini) taste fully. Miss G. Haek was the accompanist for Miss Bruggemann and Miss Kemp. Very effective was Miss Muriel Cheek in the recitative and cavatina, "Far greater in his lowly state" (Gounod). The young soprano sang sympathetically and with
