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UNIVERSITY STUDENTS' CONCERT.

The University students' annual demonstration promises to be an event of great interest. The incidents which led up to the students cutting themselves off from the regular commemoration are as follows:—Last year someone showered confetti on the Governor as he proceeded to the dais to take up his position, and afterwards a rowdy element, for which the students as a body disclaim all responsibility, made themselves objectionable to the authorities. As a result the council decided that the students were not to be admitted to this year's celebration unless they promised to refrain from references to the Chancellor and council, and to protect his Excellency from insult. This the students unhesitatingly promised, but before admitting them the council insisted upon the right of revision of the whole of the songs to be sung. This the students felt was too much. As an alternative the Chancellor suggested that they should have the Conservatorium for a concert in the evening after the celebration. The students appreciated the Chancellor's magnanimity, but felt that acceptance of his offer would be inconsistent with their decision not to attend the commemoration. They hired the Tivoli Theatre, and a programme has been arranged for Monday next. A procession will take place, starting from the University at 11 a.m., and in the evening at the Tivoli Theatre a programme will be presented of topical songs specially written for the occasion. They will be followed by a mock celebration, in which the procedure of the learned institutions of the world will be caricatured, and the evening's amusement will end with a variety entertainment. The students are determined that their concert shall be conducted with all due decorum. Any profits accruing are to be devoted to the payment of the debt incurred by the abolition of the compulsory sports' fee. A box-plan is open at Marshall's.
