

DARLING BUILDING AT UNIVERSITY.

Another milestone in the history of the Adelaide University will be passed on Monday. Some time ago the family of the late Mr. John Darling decided to perpetuate his memory, and they presented to the council of the University the sum of £15,000, with which to erect an up-to-date building, to be known as Darling Building. The site of the old police barracks, at the rear of the Museum, was chosen, and the construction work has just been completed. The official opening and an inspection of the premises will be made at 3.30 o'clock on Monday afternoon. Visitors will be shown over the interior of the place in groups. Darling Building is divided into three groups. Physiology and bio-chemistry will be confined to one department, and the other sections will be devoted to zoology and pathology. The Chancellor of the University (Sir George Murray) will deliver the opening address. Afternoon tea will be provided at the conclusion of the ceremony. After tea the guests will be escorted in groups through the laboratories, and this has restricted the number who can be invited at one time, but arrangements have been made for a later inspection by members of the medical profession.

speaking of Mr. Garnett's university work, says he showed "real philosophical ability and quite unusual clarity of thought and power of exposition," and on account of his wide acquaintance with social problems and strong intellectual qualities, prophesied a future for him as thinker, teacher, and writer. Mr. Garnett takes a deep interest in all movements for social welfare, and the Workers' Educational Association has welcomed his coming to this city by appointing him lecturer on psychology to W.E.A. classes at the University. Before going to China he was for three years pastor of the church at Northcote, Victoria, where he did fine work, especially among the young people. He begins his ministry at Grote-street on Sunday.

MINERAL SPECIMENS FOR UNIVERSITY MUSEUM.

Mr. E. Davenport Cleland (Professor Cleland's uncle), now resident in Western Australia, has presented a valuable collection of mineral specimens to the Geological Museum of the Adelaide University. These had been collected over a period of 40 years from various noted Australian mining fields. The more interesting examples were obtained in the early days of mining in the Barrier Ranges, when Thackaringa and Purnamoota were flourishing fields. Of the greatest interest is a massive slug of silver chloride, such as created so much excitement in Adelaide in those early days of the Barrier boom. The teaching of geology and mineralogy on the scale embraced by Sir Douglas Mawson's department necessitates the maintenance of extensive collections of rocks, minerals, and fossils, which are housed in the Tate Museum. Mr. Cleland has been warmly thanked by the University Council for his thought and generous action. The University has also recently received useful and valuable additions to the collections from several other gentlemen, including Sir Joseph Verco, Professor J. B. Cleland, T. J. Greenway, and others. By their gifts the donors are not only assisting the University in what is equivalent to financial help, but the specimens at once assume an added value, for they are well exhibited and utilized for instructional purposes. They are thus of far greater value than if packed away in a private house, where few are interested or have access to them.

L. V. PELLEW, CHAMPION.

Owing to the approaching inter-Varsity contests, which will be begun on the Adelaide Oval next Wednesday, considerable interest was manifested in the annual sports of the local University, held on the University Oval on Friday afternoon. A varied programme of sports, including cup and handicap events, had been arranged, and all the events were closely contested. L. V. Pellew, with 20 points, secured the coveted cup, and the four various events, in which he started, he won brilliantly. This is the third time in succession that he has gained such honours. This year, for the second time, he has annexed the 100 yards championship. At the conclusion of the gathering, Mrs. Arthur Rymill, who was introduced by the President of the University Sports Association (Mr. R. H. Wallman), presented the prizes. For many years Mrs. Rymill has been an enthusiastic supporter of the association, and at its annual meeting this year, that body elected her a life member in recognition of her services.
