

GOVERNOR'S AND SCOUTS' EULOGY.

Speaking at a Boy Scouts' concert in the Victoria Hall on Wednesday evening, the Governor referred to the death of Mr. Peter Wood. He said Mr. Wood's life had been a brilliant inspiration and example to South Australia generally, and particularly to those interested in the scout movement. The mental and physical gifts which the lads possessed, should be used not so much for success for themselves, but more especially in the interests of the community, such as the late Mr. Wood had done. He had given his energy and ability for the welfare of the people and the youth of the State. They deplored his loss, and his example was something to which all scouts should look as an ideal. His life would be kept in affectionate memory among them all.

The Chairman (Mr. J. J. Woods) said the deceased gentleman was one of the best friends the scouts had ever had. He had been one of those true friends, who did not advertise what they did. He (the speaker) had been connected with the scout movement for many years, and during that time Mr. Wood had never once failed to give assistance when it was wanted. On one occasion when the movement was hard pressed, they went to the Government for assistance. They sat and talked, but the assistance was not forthcoming. Mr. Wood, who was among them, generously advanced £500, saying "We can fix it up afterwards." Mr. Wood had been a true scout, inasmuch as he had always been prepared—prepared to assist those who needed it. He had been a lover of animals, kind to everybody, and had seen in the great scout movement something that would assist his country, and his Empire, and had helped it to the best of his ability. They all mourned Mr. Wood's loss. Scouts would be the poorer for it, and Heaven would be the richer.

DIPLOMA IN COMMERCE.

We have received a copy of the regulations for the diploma in commerce at the Adelaide University. The curriculum offered some measure of free choice in subjects of study. All candidates for the diploma, however, must take economics and commercial history, economic geography, No. 1, industrial and commercial law, and accountancy and auditing. A knowledge of these four subjects, it is pointed out, is essential to all, whether engaged in commerce, industry, finance, or the public services. Beyond this the candidate must choose three out of the following list of subjects, but one of the three must be selected from the first two:—Industrial practice, commercial practice, banking and exchange, public administration, transport and marketing, Australian industries, statistics, and economic geography, No. 2. The lectures are not confined to persons desirous of taking the diploma. Those who do not wish to do so may attend any one or more of the courses of lectures. Those who wish, however, to equip themselves properly for a commercial career are strongly recommended to take the whole diploma course.

PUBLIC EXAMINATION RESULTS.

From "OXONIAN":—In your issue of Thursday, I note the announcement that "the higher public examination results would be made available next day, the 23rd instant. This is five days later than last year, when the higher results were published on December 18, the senior results on December 29, and the junior results were delayed until January 18, 1921. Evidently those concerned intend this year putting up even worse records. It is generally understood that the actual examiners are in no way to blame for the unreasonable delays. They are said to do their work expeditiously enough. It is in the recording, tabulating, and publishing of these results that valuable time is wasted. Truly the teachers and parents in this State are long-suffering beyond compare! In no other part of the British Empire would the tardiness of which I complain be tolerated. Fancy people in England waiting more than, say, four, or at the most, five weeks, for the result of the Cambridge or Oxford local, of the Society of Arts, or of the College of Preceptors, or scores of similar examinations. Thousands of candidates sit every year at these, with the sure and certain knowledge that within a stated number of weeks the results will be made known. How different things are in South Australia! Last year hundreds of boys—to say nothing of the girls—were kept in needless suspense until well past the middle of January, 1921—hundreds of boys whose future movements depended altogether upon the results of the junior public or junior commercial examination they had sat for early in November, 1920! This sort of thing might have been in place in the jogs-trot days of "Auld Lang Syne," but it is surely quite out of date in the twentieth century. Cannot the proper authorities see to it that the present methods of dealing with public examination results at the University are superseded by methods in keeping with the progress of the times and the increase in the number of candidates?

PUBLIC EXAMINATION RESULTS.

From G. G. NEWMAN:—I should like to support "Oxonian" in his remarks upon the unduly long waiting for and delay in the publication of the junior and senior examination results. When Professor Coleman Phillipson in his first year published his list, about two days after the exam., he caused something like a mild shock. And a very pleasant one for those concerned. "Oxonian" referred to the jog-trot days of the University, but I would like to tell him that it is not a great many years since all the results were published in the early weeks of December. And the number of candidates has not increased abnormally. In 1915 there were 888 junior candidates. This year there were only about a hundred or so more. Perhaps the "go-slow" policy is at work somewhere. Half the interest of the results has died out before they appear; many of the successful candidates receive no praise from their fellows at the time, and when the results are spoken of a year later they create no interest at all. It is up to other teachers to back up "Oxonian" in his contention, and to try to see all results out before the end of the year.

MR. JUSTICE POOLE.

Mr. Justice Poole, who is a Master of Arts of the University of Melbourne, was on Wednesday, at the commemoration ceremony in Elder Hall, admitted to the same status in the University of Adelaide. His honor was presented by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts (Professor Wilton), and the Chancellor (Sir George Murray), in conferring upon him the degree of master of Arts ad eundem gradum, remarked, to the accompaniment of much applause, "For reasons which I need not state it gives me extraordinary pleasure to admit Mr. Justice Poole to this degree."

From GEORGE J. ELLIS:—As a candidate at the recent Senior Public examination, I must protest against the delay in posting the results. Usually they are posted at the beginning of the New Year, but on ringing up the examination board this morning I was told that they would not appear for another fortnight at the least. Why should hundreds of candidates be kept for weeks in ignorance of their fate? The students of the State are never considered by the examiners.

From GUY LE CORNU, Headley Beach-road:—When I was studying in the old country I was never kept in suspense waiting for exam. results, as I am at present. Something should be done to remedy the intolerable slackness which seems to pervade the board of examiners at the University. I trust that the examiners will take some steps to secure a quicker announcement of the results.

From "CLERICUS SECUNDUS":—I am a teacher of a class of 40 for the Junior University examination. Although it took place nearly two months ago, I am informed on good authority that the results will not be known for at least another month. Surely this delay is outrageous. As there are only about six or seven thousand papers to be examined, and as one man can check 50 easily in a day, the army of examiners should be able to announce the results at the most a month after the examination. Many of my students' careers are being held up owing to the unnecessary delay in announcing the results.

From "DISTRACTED PARENT":—I would like to draw attention to the long delay in publishing the Senior Public examination results. My daughter, aged 17, who is of a highly nervous disposition, has had her Christmas holidays ruined through the long delay which now seems inevitable. On communicating with the examination board, I find that the results will not be published for another three weeks. I hope the examiners will have their results ready before that.

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
