Thanks for letting me know about Grundy's royalties. Of course, whatever arrangement you have agreed with him I should concur in, for I believe he was really helpful when in your Department.

I shall look forward to a visit from you early in June, though really you can make a date at quite short notice with comparative safety. I should much like to know what you think of my attempt to bring Bayes' argument up to date using as improved apparatus the radioactive source and detectors instead of a billiard table. It shows how remotely at secondhand mathematicians seem to acquire their information about Bayes, that they seem to represent him often as fishing probabilities a priori out of some sort of metaphysical <u>owigkeit</u> instead of obtaining them experimentally just like fiducial probabilities. Indeed, he insists on doing this most explicitly, and obviously abandoned an earlier attempt at justifying his theorem without a specifically experimental preliminary.
