My dear Frank,

I have now managed to turn up a 3rd edition and there is no section 21.1 in it; the date was 1930. I rather forget what the circumstances were that led me to develop the distribution of the product of two or more independent probabilities, probably I just saw someone in Nature or elsewhere multiplying them together and taking the product as the level of significance of the combined values. I suppose the Pearsonians you refer to are interested in making some phony claim to priority.

I am enclosing some correspondence asking for permission to reprint some of our tables in a collection to be published, I understand, by a superior counsel of scientific research. I guess we shall have to dictate the form of acknowledgement, such as, "Reprinted by kind permission of the authors and publishers from Statistical Tables, R.A. Fisher and F. Yates, fourth edition, Oliver and Boyd, Tweeddale Court, Edinburgh 1953", to appear with each table reproduced, and in the preface to the collection.

Of course I shbuld like you to improve on this if you care to.
