Dear Fisher

I wrote to you because I
have nothing to do !! So don't
trouble yourself to answer. In the
Listener of yesterday is Mrs. MacKenna's
broadcast talk about my father.
It is generally very nice in tone,
and merits praise, I think. But
I doubt if she thoroughly understands
natural selection. She says in effect
that civilized man is protected by
tools &c in such a way as to make
it difficult for selection to act.
But civilization can only check
selection by lowering the birth rate
or increasing supplies. The contest
between two animals more for
survival might be just as severe, or

more severe, than that between two
naked savages. The slogan of the
survival of the fittest has been too
often used, she says, "to justify
the oppression of the poor by the
rich". Where, I wonder? I suspect, like
Holden, Hopkins & Giesberg, she
would like to get her knife into
me. But I believe it has been both
right and politic for me to say
what seems to me to be the truth.
And I suspect the underlying and
probably unconscious motive is to
carry favour with Socialists by
attacking such as me, — and then
to go a long way in following what
I have suggested. Well no more
of this.

I have written something on
free will and on the uniformity

of eleven chapters. I want them
to be read by at least two
persons! And I shall I suppose
sacrifice you or the other as one
of them!

Have you seen enclosed? I
find him difficult to understand.
His error, I take it, is that if he
cannot see the use of a structure
which is developing into an obviously
useful structure, he not only denies
that it is useful, but also that it
can be correlated with some other
useful growth. I suppose in nearly
every case a useful structure has
shown for something useful for some
other purpose.

you — but don't expect an
