My dear Fisher.

Giving advice is a very dangerous game — to the giver, as he is so likely to make an ass of himself, and to the receiver because he may be diverted from the wisest course. The immediate rise in salary is less than I had understood, and I did not know that your department is as big as it is. All that makes a difference. I have been on 2 or 3 of these boards, when candidates have been interviewed. The chairman has often asked his candidate if he wants any more

information about the job, and  
I think it appeared that they  
had always enquired beforehand.  
On this point I may have  
misunderstood you a little - It  
seems to me that it would be  
a wise precaution before applying  
or before the interview, it would  
not matter which, to write to the  
person to whom the application is  
to be sent to ask what is  
the size and nature of the  
personnel, if any, of the departmental  
over which you would have to  
preside. Of course a lot of  
professorships have no staff -  
like that held by my brother at  
Cambridge - I am sure it would  
be useless to ask about future  
possibilities. At least I know his.

I should have strongly opposed any answer being given on such a point, because it would always serve as a basis for future correspondence in a way most undesirable. But - certainly get all you can to help your judgment.

I have had little experience myself of team work, and my judgment is of no value on its merits as a whole. My father wrote Domestic Animals when he was 59 years of age. He had half prepared a manuscript on *Vernonia* under Nature (no one seems to know what - he became of it!!) and we hoped he would go on with it. But - he said he was physically incapable of attacking another big job, and he took to his botanical work as heavy much easier. Certainly team

work does a lot, and it wants  
a good man to shore it  
along. But I still think that  
the highest and most original  
work is done by the nearly  
unnoticed individual. Here  
I am no doubt getting into  
very debatable ground.

Does a lot of underlying work  
take a lot of time, and the  
question is whether with each  
individual that time could be  
better spent in some other way.  
Anyhow I want you to have  
time enough to satisfy your  
head of all that is required  
in it.
