I am sure that my father would have approved of them. I write this first, because the thought of sending them came

first-in time. Now as to your ⁽²⁾
Book on Experiments, I took M^{rs}
Fisher's note to mean that - I
was to keep it. I consequently
pasted in her note, as I sometimes
do, and put it into my book-
shelf, intending to take it down
again later on for further study.
Most of it is beyond me, but
I should like to see its back
remaining amongst my other books,
and shall, therefore, keep it. I
feel sure that this is what you
would like me to do.

As to your long letter, which
I am sorry you wrote, unless it
should stir you up to publish
your views on Meadell in
some scientific journal. It seems

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to see that they are valuable & interesting. I was also glad to read what you say about the Origin. I shall read your letter carefully again. You do not, I think, express any opinion on a point I believe I raised, namely whether it would not be better for anyone, who is not an actual student of science, to read the 2nd edition in preference to the 6th. — I feel much of the controversy with Mivart, for example,

it hardly worth reading except
by the student. Do not answer
me; but if you ever feel
disposed, put your views ^{on this point} on
record publicly. I don't want
to waste your time.

I have tried to write one
or two little things lately; but
so far they have been sick born.
I am trying my hand again; and
if I succeed better, I shall send
it to you for an opinion; for
I am nearly sure that my
underlying aim would meet
with your approval. But I prefer
to see the effort refine also.
