Dear *Fisher*

I am resigning the position of President of the International Federation of Eugenic Societies this Autumn, and Mrs. Hodson will tender her resignation of the Assistant Secretaryship at the same time. As the Headquarters are likely to be in the United States for a few years, no doubt an American Assistant Secretary will be nominated in Mrs. Hodson's place and her resignation will be accepted. Should this occur and should the circumstances appear propitious I should like to propose her election as a member of the Federation for three years, that is in the ordinary way for members who do not represent societies, and in doing this I should like to be able to say that my action has the approval of the Eugenic Society. Mrs. Hodson has done excellent work at these meetings, and as far as I can judge is very popular with the members. According to present rules, each country may be represented by four members, Great Britain having only two at present. If a majority of the replies received from Members of Council express their approval, I shall presume that I may state that my action has the approval of the council. Mrs. Hodson has no idea that I am making this suggestion or taking any action in the matter.
