If a population is divided
into classes, each covering a
given range of differentiation,

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The greatest effect will be produced by the selection acting on the middle class, because it is the largest. But if we are looking to an increase in fertility of a non-selective character, the only effect of its action on the middle class will be to make the group more concentrated about the same centre. If we are considering the shifting of the centre by an increase in fertility, then it still seems to me that there are two most important classes, namely,

those at the two points of
standard deviation. Is not that
so? But don't answer.
