My dear Fisher

Here is my paper, of postulates. I have found it difficult to write, as it is in parts trying to put mathematical ideas into ordinary words, and it is in these parts I have most likely to have blundered. I should be very glad of your help in detecting blemishes, and should also like a frank

opinion as to how it strikes you in the broad. You will not like the multiple heteromorphs, but you must bear them as well as you can!

In writing this I have felt strongly what you say about leisure. But to get leisure needs both absence of work and L.S.D. And unless I am utterly wrong, neither of these will come from

work on the land. If you do  
settle in the country, I hope it  
will be not too far from  
Oxford, Cambridge, or some  
centre where you can keep in  
some personal touch with  
new scientific movements. Do  
you know Edgeworth of  
Oxford? He seems to be  
about the 'purest' of the  
statisticians. You should get  
to know men in the same  
line.
