D^r. C. G. Campbell has
been down here. He is head of
the American Eugenic Research
Assoc. (I am not sure if I
gave any titles right). He tells
me that Davenport is retiring
next July on account of age.
He is the head of two institutions,
originally quite distinct, now
both under the Carnegie Institute.
There are (1) The Eugenic Record
Office, & (2) The Dept. of Research
in Evolution. Campbell is very
keen that they should be separated.

suggest that you should be in
any way influenced in your

felt ~~compelled~~ ^{compelled} to condemn his
work - the paper I sent you
recently - it would hurt him
far less if the publication

were delayed until after July
next. I have not studied
it, and can form no opinion.

Dr Campbell would, I think,
like to know your opinion on
this work of Langhain. I
do not feel quite sure if
you will care to give it, and
if it would be wise to do
so.
