Dear Fisher,

I am really most grateful to you for giving up your time to the more data: and so is Dondeanell, who caught the specimens. Your analysis throws more light on the situation than I could have hoped for.

Taking everything into consideration: ecology of the species, area available for it on the island etc., I am inclined to feel that your estimate of 5,000 for the total breeding population, and 1,000 as the number flying at the highest level, is extremely reasonable. I had no clear idea what it would be but, thinking over the circumstances, I am convinced you are about right. Certainly

The 50% elimination is much higher than I should have expected - but I have no real grounds for this opinion.

I am sure it will be worth while from several points of view to get a better estimate this year. A system (which can easily be arranged) for dating the releases might provide quite satisfactory data. Then, as I hope, as have obtained this information, I will tell you again about it, if I may!

I am so sorry about this Scholarship, I have particularly wanted to attend the Genetical Society meeting on Thursday. But the time-table is so complicated they will not consider allowing it - in and such a lot of people are involved.
