Dear Fisher,

On thinking the matter over I agree with you in all important particulars. I have therefore re-written the last two or three pages of the paper on dominance in order to discuss the points raised by Jack Haldane, and to include your suggestion on polymorphism. It is very kind of you to let me do so; but I think it important that it should be made public, as the matter is rather under discussion just.

I would therefore be greatly obliged if you would glance through what I have said, to see if you think it set out in an acceptable form. To save time you need only read from near the bottom of p. 6 onwards; the rest of the paper is practically as it was.

I hope I have made it clear that the suggestion in regard to polymorphism is yours (see p. 7). If this suggestion is not at all my own it would really be best

if we signed the paper together. I only  
hesitate in regard to this in case  
there may be some points in the  
paper as a whole to which you might  
not be entirely willing to subscribe.

I did not feel justified  
in adding the (most interesting) point  
in regard to the Orthoptera, that you  
have found a significant deficiency  
in the numbers of some homozygous  
dominant types there also. That  
should come from you. P. polytes  
and Colias are a different matter,  
as you have already published concerning

them; so I could discuss them  
giving full references.
