Many thanks for your long letter. I had, of course, no right to bother you with the matter at all, except my feeling that, if Kleczkowska is to get a fair deal in his present position, it will only be by the positive recommendation of people like yourself and Harrington, who can judge of the value of his work. I quite see that he ought not to be regarded as a substitute for Race, and indeed he would be quite incapable of being so, if only from the fact that he is a foreigner.

I hope, none the less, you may be ready to put in a good word for Kleczkowska to Harrington, or any one else whose ~~opinion~~ opinion may be of value.

We had quite a little schuffle getting into the Galton Laboratory this morning, and, until the College will come to an arrangement, I and Miss North may be the only people about the place for a time. I am still, however, somewhat in the dark as to what the College is driving at.
